Blood Bought Salvation

Objective of Lesson

God Almighty still demands blood. We no longer offer the blood of goats and calves as in the Old Testament, as this was a picture of the sacrifice of Christ Himself. They are no longer needed because He has obtained eternal redemption for us. You cannot be saved without the blood of Christ. The Lord Jesus Christ redeemed His people from their sins with His own, precious blood.

Scripture Reference

Hebrews 10: 1-17 For the law having a shadow of good things to come, and not the very image of the things, can never with those sacrifices which they offered year by year continually make the comers thereunto perfect. 2 For then would they not have ceased to be offered? because that the worshippers once purged should have had no more conscience of sins. 3 But in those sacrifices there is a remembrance again made of sins every year. 4 For it is not possible that the blood of bulls and of goats should take away sins. 5 Wherefore when he cometh into the world, he saith, Sacrifice and offering thou wouldest not, but a body hast thou prepared me: 6 In burnt offerings and sacrifices for sin thou hast had no pleasure. 7 Then said I, Lo, I come (in the volume of the book it is written of me,) to do thy will, O God. 8 Above when he said, Sacrifice and offering and burnt offerings and offering for sin thou wouldest not, neither hadst pleasure therein; which are offered by the law; 9 Then said he, Lo, I come to do thy will, O God. He taketh away the first, that he may establish the second. 10 By the which will we are sanctified

through the offering of the body of Jesus Christ once for all. 11 And every priest standeth daily ministering and offering oftentimes the same sacrifices, which can never take away sins: 12But this man, after he had offered one sacrifice for sins forever, sat down on the right hand of God; 13From henceforth expecting till his enemies be made his footstool. 14For by one offering he hath perfected forever them that are sanctified. 15Whereof the Holy Ghost also is a witness to us: for after that he had said before, 16This is the covenant that I will make with them after those days, saith the Lord, I will put my laws into their hearts, and in their minds will I write them; 17And their sins and iniquities will I remember no more.

Lesson Instructions

1. In the Bible, the scriptures tell us of a people call the Israelites. The Israelites were a group of people chosen by God, to be His beloved and chosen people. He treated them special and revealed things to them that He did not reveal to any other people on earth.
2. The things they did and the ceremonies they performed were taught to them by God. These ceremonies and pictures were not taught to any other people. The Israelites were a special people, set apart by God from all other groups. All the ceremonies and laws God taught them was a picture of how God saves His people from their sins.
3. One of the things God taught His chosen people is that we are a sinful people, and our sins must be paid for. God will not accept anything that is not perfect, and our sin corrupts us and makes us imperfect. God taught His chosen people that blood must be shed to pay for their sins. Lastly, God taught Israel that He **MUST** be worshipped, and their sins must be paid for in a very certain way.
4. On a day appointed by God, the representative and head of each family, a man, had to go out to his flock of bulls, goats, or lambs and pick out one

animal that was to be killed and sacrificed to God. This was required of all Israelite families, as a ceremonial payment for the sins they had committed. The bull, goat, or lamb had to be perfect. The man would pick out the animal and set it apart from the rest of the herd. He would go out and inspect that animal for four days. If there was one single spot, freckle, scratch, or blemish on it, then they could not sacrifice that bull, goat, or lamb to God. They had to find a perfect and spotless lamb, because God would not accept anything less.

5. Once they found the spotless lamb there were other rules they had to follow. They could only kill it at a certain time and they could only sacrifice it at a certain place. Why would God have them do this? What was He teaching them/us here?
6. Do we still follow this ceremony today? No. Was He teaching them that the blood of bulls and goats will take away their sins? NO. Why don't we offer goats or lambs as payment for our sins today? The Bible tells us the answer to this question, and that is the verse we are going to learn about today. Hebrews 9:12 - "Neither by the blood of goats and calves, but by his (Jesus Christ) own blood he (the Son of God) entered in once into the holy place, having obtained eternal redemption for us."
7. What does this verse mean? It means God commanded a perfect spotless goat or sheep to be sacrificed in order to teach us what Jesus Christ was going to do for His people when He came to this earth. Jesus Christ is the spotless lamb sacrificed for His people's sins. This verse tells us we no longer offer bulls and goats, because they could never put away our sins. The people of Israel had to sacrifice an animal over and over again every year, but when Christ's precious blood was shed for His people's sins, there was nothing left to pay.
8. What is another reason the blood of bulls and goats cannot pay for our sins? It was not human blood. It has to be human blood, the blood of a man. That blood which was so freely shed for us was the same as the blood which flows

in our veins today. The only difference was this: His blood was not tainted with sin as our blood is.

9. What is another reason the blood of bulls and goats cannot pay for our sins?

It was not the blood of a sinless man. God's requirement for a spotless lamb is a picture of what Christ is. He was blameless and lived a perfect life. He knew no sin. He never committed any evil. He is the just and Holy One. The price with which men are redeemed is spoken in this verse, "...the precious blood of Christ, as of a Lamb without blemish and without spot." (1 Pet. 1:18-19) If He had had any sin in Him, He could not have been a redeemer from sin.

10. What is another reason the blood of bulls and goats cannot pay for our sins?

It was not holy or divine blood. It has to be the blood of one who is the same as God and yet still be a Man. It is the blood of Jesus Christ, God's Son, which cleanses us from all sin. (1 John 1:7)
